

Ara Poutama Aotearoa's Hōkai Rangi strategy calls for the development of a Kaupapa Māori Health service, inclusive of Rongoā Māori practitioners (Hōkai Rangi action 2.4)


Te Matatiki o Te Oranga (the Spring of Wellbeing) is the name given to the design phase of the kaupapa and this is to be co-developed with tangata whenua (Māori partners and stakeholders) and tangata Tiriti (non-Māori partners and stakeholders).

Te Matatiki o te Oranga will be developed over four phases and is currently in Phase 2 of the design of the service



### **Corrections Act – Equivalency of care**

- Prisoners are entitled to receive medical treatment that is reasonably necessary (sections 69(1)(g), 75(1)). All prisons must have a health centre that is adequately equipped for the health needs of prisoners (regulation 71(2)):
- The equipment and facilities must be such that the Department is able to provide health care to a standard that is reasonably equivalent to the standard of healthcare available to the public (section 75(2)).

### Trauma informed care – 'Every interaction matters'



Trauma informed approaches means working within the principles of trauma informed practice:

- Safety we look after the physical and emotional safety of women prisoners, staff, and the site.
- **Trustworthiness** our boundaries, decisions, and operations are transparent and consistent.
- Choice we provide choice where possible, even if these are limited or small.
- **Collaboration** we make decisions about women with women. Where this isn't possible, we communicate decisions and actions with women, explaining *why*.
- Empowerment we build women's skills and resilience.
- responsive, acknowledge historical trauma, and leverage the healing value of traditional cultural connections.



# What is it like to work in a prison?

- It's a bit like going through airport security
- Your bags are scanned
- Security checks You will go through a detector and may be wanded
- Rules about what can be brought in
- No day is the same
- You get real job satisfaction



### Health services provided in prison

#### **Nurse led service**

- Primary care plus
- Acute/emergency care
- Long-term conditions management
- Palliative care (Compassionate release)
- Residential (medication rounds)
- Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) support





## What does a day in the life of a nurse look like?

Pae ora approach and working to the top of your scope of practice, which could include:

- Health assessment, screening & immunisation
- Emergency Care
- Long term conditions
- Women, men, elderly and youth health focus
- Venepuncture, examinations, smears, swabs
- Wound care
- Mental health and addiction
- Oncology, palliative care
- Education, training, mentorship, coaching, precepting
- Nurse led clinics & dental triage
- Liaison with external health providers
- Health education and promotion

- Forensic services tertiary
- List who's who ACC, psychologists, trauma counsellors

- Improving Mental Health services
- Intervention Support Practice Teams

## What does a day in the life of a mental health nurse look like?

### Mental health service provision for Māori with an equity approach, which could include:

- Assessment, triage and care coordination
- Education, training and mentoring for colleagues
- Health promotion and skills development for people in our care
- Liaising with external mental health providers
- Quality assurance
- Clinical governance
- Providing a nursing perspective to the mental health MDT





## Other Health Services Provided Include but not limited to:

- Dentistry
- General Practitioner (GP)
- Physiotherapy
- Forensics (tertiary mental health)
- Midwifery
- Podiatry (diabetic patients)
- Venepuncture
- ACC counsellors (sensitive claims)



## Why is prison nursing different?

- Refusing medical treatment
- Voluntary refusal of food
- Self-harm and suicide
- Internal concealment
- Prescribing risks and mitigations
- Managing people in directed segregation
- Major and minor site incidents, riots, escapes (rare)
