Objectives In 2019, under the World Kidney Day theme of 'Kidney health for everyone everywhere', the National Kidney Foundation of Samoa undertook an extensive community screening campaign to detect the estimated prevalence of chronic kidney disease (CKD) and its associated risk factors in the community.

Conclusions This is the first paper to report the estimated prevalence of CKD in Samoa or any other Pacific Island nation. It reveals an urgent need for further studies on the epidemiology of CKD in Samoa, to develop country-specific prevention strategies to mitigate this growing burden and prevent subsequent CKD associated complications including development of kidney failure and premature death. Investing in Our Future: Building Strong and Resilient Health Systems in the Indo-Pacific Region

This report presents the findings and recommendations from a rapid desk-based review of the current status of health system strengthening in seven Indo-Pacific countries: Cambodia, Fiji, Indonesia, Lao People's Democratic Republic, Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands and Vietnam. The framework used to undertake the review was an adapted version of the World Health Organization (WHO) Building Blocks framework, with the incorporation of three cross-cutting key elements: equity in access, quality of care and resource optimisation. This report was designed to identify and prioritise health system strengthening initiatives that prevent impacts of health security threats and strengthen the ability to respond to these threats in the Pacific region.
